The trophy sponsored in the name of the late Lion Alec Spence was presented to the sponsoring club, MK Stony Stratford by DG Lesley's daughter Lion Melisa Murphy from Sandwell LC, 105CW. DG updated Convention on: Attendees: 236, Delegates: 77.

CNRO officer PDG Doreen Allen introduced the second resolution:

Resolution 2 Proposed by the District Cabinet; This Convention resolves that:

District 105A shall adopt the International Standard District Constitution dated July 2023 and to include current District 105A By Laws

Explanatory notes:

The current District 105A Constitution and By Laws document on our District website, has not been updated for many years and is at variance with the mandatory parts of the International Standard District Constitution. The District Cabinet has debated at length and advice was sought from Lions International Legal department and MD CRNO Trevor Kell. The Cabinet has therefore decided that the best way forward is to have this complete document adopted at District 105A Convention March 2024

The areas in yellow are those clauses that are defined as mandatory(compulsory). The red paragraph on page 12 was voted in at the July 2023 Boston International Convention and will be in place as mandatory from 1st January 2024. The light blue paragraphs are District 105A By Laws. This has meant some changes in dates to facilitate the smooth running of the District. The document also includes an automatic update paragraph which will allow future District CRNO to update immediately, any approved amendments to the International Constitution and By Laws that are passed at an International Convention.

Doreen thanked PDGs John Savell and Elliot Shubert for their help in producing this document.

The resolution was proposed by PDG Doreen Allen and seconded by Lion Satnam Loyal on behalf of the District Cabinet.

There would need to be a 2/3rds majority to pass this resolution. In favour: 72, Against: 0, Abstentions: 0. Resolution passed.

The DGs Advisory team, were recognised, there were no questions of the reports, they were moved for adoption, proposed by Lion Rajnikant Sheth and seconded by PDG Ramesh Parmar. Convention approved the reports, with 1 against, 2 abstentions.

All ZC were thanked for their leadership and dedication by DG Lesley.

ZC Luke Adams gave an informative presentation about Bees. Luke answered questions from Convention.

PDG Sarbjit Assi spoke to convention about Alzheimer's and the recent loss of his wife Kuldip, who was an Alzheimer's ambassador. An emotive video was played at the convention.

PDG Doreen Allen introduced the Governor elections. Doreen confirmed that there is one applicant for each of the posts, all of whom had filed their application by the due date of the 15th Aug 2023. Each applicant had been verified by the Nominations committee.

S@A George Matthew gave details of the Banquet and Ball this evening, wished those heading home a safe journey and then invited all to join him in singing Auld Lang Syne.



DG Kadu, Dignitaries, and my family of lions

The District has been on a steady course of membership growth for a few years and this year it stood at 1227 at the time of writing this report, and this reflects on various aspects of budget and income for the District.

I must commend the new set of Club Officers particularly the Club Treasurers, who have made their best efforts to settle the dues promptly as well as sending me their Clubs financial statements as soon as these were ready and available. Also, whilst most Clubs settled their dues promptly, there were a few persistent late payers who had to be chased up. Non-payment of MD and District and LCI dues leads to financial suspension for the Clubs and restricts their service activities, until resolved.

I must urge all the Clubs to set up online payment systems with their banks and bring in a change in their payment system, which is much needed now and moving forward.

I resolved most of the queries from treasurers, there are two lots of half yearly dues payable each year; payment of invoices from the District for District and Multiple District Dues, Club Insurance and Youth Funds, for which I sent out dues invoices on half yearly basis and settlement of monthly continuous statements from Lions Clubs International Oakbrook in US Dollars, converted in sterling at their conversion rate, for payment in sterling, made to LCI District 105A.

I believe many of the questions posed by the Club Treasurers could be resolved by attending the Treasurers Sessions at the Incoming Officers online Seminar, which is geared to dealing with such matters. I sincerely hope that when they next receive notification of such Seminars, that they will make the effort to attend and participate.

Enquiries from the Clubs, particularly regarding the International Dues and amounts due to Lions Clubs International, based on numbers reported to them, were satisfactorily resolved; attendance at the Incoming Officers seminar would have given a better understanding on the working of Lions Clubs International, and highlight the need for correct numbers to be reported on MyLCI regularly each month.

The Financial Statements for the year to 30th June 2024 and the Budget Proposals for the year 2025/2026 are included in the Convention papers for your consideration and adoption. These were duly approved at the 30 September 2024, District 105A's Cabinet Special Meeting.

Administration Account

The Financial Statements shows surplus on Admin Account of £1951.87 (2023: £896.08) Surplus on 105A News Fund £558.59 (2023: £1479.38) & Surplus on Convention fund for £ 4.41 (2023: £0).

The main areas of saving were in underutilised budgets for Admin Fund, District 105A News. Our Membership numbers on paid basis worked out at 1235, 25 members more than budgeted. The Balance Sheet reflects a very healthy financial situation with Bank balances supporting various Funds as reflected thereon totalling £56,806.63 (2023: £55,223.42).

Charity Accounts

The Charity Account Statements detail collections of £83,633.82 (2023: £105,780.46) and Investment Income of £897.92 (2023: £337.82). The Charity Funds at the year-end amounted to £105,428.03 (2023:

£112,167.99).

Most of the collections balances at yearend have been disbursed, as advised, after 30th June 2024 leaving funds for ongoing projects/appeals, which will be utilised/disbursed in due course.

Budget Proposals -2025/26

Based on the current circumstances and in consultation with the incoming VDG and Finance Committee set by the DG (reference: Article IV District Committee's in the constitution), I set out the 2025/2026 budget for you all. The Budget encompasses the challenges and uncertainties of the high costs we all face.

The Budget for 2025/26 is based on 1250 members, which I am hopeful the District will be able to maintain and perhaps increase through formation of New Clubs and members. The allocation between various funds will remain unchanged.

I will strive to maintain the District Dues at reasonable levels for future years as much as possible, but due to increased costs it may be difficult, and dues may need to be increased to reflect reality. The budget was duly approved at the 30 September 2024, District 105A's Cabinet Special Meeting. This Year the budget recognizes few items like Twining District and Symposium as done in previous year.

Twinning: Cabinet approval 2019/2020 was to make available, funds to allow the hosting of up to 3 couples from our Twinning Districts to attend our District Convention social functions as our guests. These costs would be met from reserves. Their travel and accommodation would be their responsibility.

Symposium: is a programme approved by the MD Council of Governors, designed for lions who have less than five years' service. It is an opportunity to promote Lions beyond their Club, to look at opportunities, to grow and inspire them. Seven years ago, there was a lack of leaders coming forward, not only as DGs, but as District and MD officers too. One of the aims of the Symposium was to ensure succession planning in our future leadership. The success of this programme is shown in our very own 1st VDG Harvinder, who attended the 1st ever Symposium, there has also been many District officers and Clubs Presidents who have graduated over the past 7 years. MD have introduced a nonrefundable deposit (Currently £75pp) for attendees, every year there is a dropout rate, of which the MD picks up these costs (hotel and food) and Council felt this was unfair on members. The Finance Committee strongly recommend that we should invest in our leaders of tomorrow, therefore, upon full completion of the symposium, the deposit would be refunded to those attendees.

The District currently has large reserves that have been built up over many years, the Committee feel that in line with MD policy, we only need to hold a year's operating cost as reserves. The reserves could be used to reduce the need to increase dues, which at this current time, we believe would be welcomed by members. The Committee have worked hard in looking at all costs to make savings where possible and to ensure we get value for money. Any reserves should be spent wisely but could be used to support District growth. If necessary, venue hire costs for new Club formations, and supporting District or Zone Membership opportunities.

As the GLT lead who has done the leadership training job for more years than I care to remember, this year has been quite an involved year in that the amount of training was notched-up considerably from top to bottom.

Starting with the bottom end of the scale I introduced "pre-induction" orientation training to speak to potential members of new Clubs and Club branches before they signed up to become Lions. In some cases, the induction took place after the Club had been formed.

For the general membership, we offered monthly webinars on the first Saturday of each month starting at 10am on different subjects. The attendance varied from very large numbers (around 60 for the social media and Canva training including training on the portal) to a handful of members who attended to hear about the multifaceted youth activities Clubs can participate in.

We have also offered members of all Clubs the opportunity to participate in the monthly drop-in sessions on zoom where, after an opening discussion on one of the main celebrated causes supported by Lions, we have opened the floor to have a discussion about anything to do with Lionism whether it is relating to Club matters or even District matters.

At the top end of the scale, I started the year with a full day training for incoming Zone chairs and we have continued to support them by having a briefing session on the first Saturday of each month where we have had an open discussion about matters to do with Zones, Zone meetings and Zone reports as well as general discussions about anything to do with their responsibilities as Zone Chairs.

The Certified Guiding Lion programme is also in progress. Potential Guiding Lions have been working on their own completing a workbook which will qualify them to attend the face-to-face final training session at which they will be certified or, in the case of those who were certified over three years ago, to be re-certified.

All in all, an extensive and wide training programme that I hope has been of benefit to members. During the remaining half of the year there is to be training for Trustees, and incoming Club officers as well as incoming Zone chairs.

We have introduced one Leo Club in the District which was charted on the 26th of September 2024 by the

international called Leo Club of Hendon Stars.

More good news, 2 fully-fledged Clubs are in discussion but this has not yet come to fruition, fingers crossed hopefully in next few months.

Forming new Clubs has been a challenge and discussions are continuing. I have been trying to focus on communities not represented in our District, but the process is slow. We still have a couple of months so I will keep persevering.

In July 2023, a new membership growth campaign "Mission 1.5" was launched at the International Convention in Boston. The goal is to reach a worldwide membership of 1.5 million by the year 2027. Have attended the Mission 1.5 Summit in Oslo Norway in October 2024 organized by the International. Message from the Summit was to form new Clubs which will increase membership in the long run. We are aware of the back door which will always be there, we have to work harder, come up with new ideas on retention in the District.

I have regularly attended monthly meetings with District GAT and MD - GMT/GET.

Since our last Convention there was a significant membership drop at the end of June - with a drop of 50 members being reported in the June figures, down to 1207 members. This unfortunately put District 105A back into transition status. Whilst our "targets" set by International were very modest we as a District have set our own target to get out of transition and to end the year in June 2025 with greater than 1250 members.

In October myself, the DG and our GET coordinator went to Oslo for the Mission 1.5 summit. Mission 1.5 is the Lions International programme which aims to increase our worldwide membership from its current level of just under 1.4 million to 1.5 million members. The summit introduced strategies to help achieve these goals which include expansion of our District to 1300 members, expansion of the MD to 10,000 members and International to 1.5 million by 30th June 2027. The summit hopefully laid the groundwork to stop the decline in membership across Europe as a whole, but it energised the UK contingent to try and promote some significant growth over the next three years.

As you will see from other reports there have been three Club branch formations and one full Club formation so far, this Lionistic year, and a couple more in the pipeline. This has boosted our numbers up to 1228 and there are all the members of the new Club still to be added to these figures.

In January we held three mentoring meetings. The idea behind these meetings was to talk to members who feel that they need mentoring, as well as those members who would like to become mentors. Part of this policy is aimed at preventing some of the loss of members we have experienced over the last few years. If members become disillusioned with their current Club, opportunities can be explored to help them move to another Club. This has also shown promise in that some members of the newly formed London Fortitude Club are members who had recently left Lions.

In November we distributed 2000 leaflets around one of the new housing estates in Aylesbury, as part of the Aylesbury Rebuild Programme. Thanks to our little band of dedicated helpers (including at least one non-Lion) we dropped the leaflets and held a public meeting a week later in the local community hall. There were two interested people – connected to the community centre, so overall no members of the public responded to the leaflets. However, I am reliably informed that this is "normal" and that we should do two more in the same area at least a couple of months apart. We also publicised it on Facebook and had some posters around the area. This is an on-going project and has been made necessary because the Lions Club of Aylesbury's ageing membership had dwindled down to just 2.

Having ended the last Lionistic year with a large number of dropped members, we started the current year with 1207 members, putting us back into transition status.

Since July the membership team have been actively trying to increase the numbers - and so far, 100 members have been added in the Lionistic year so far. Sadly, for various reasons, we have also lost 82 members in this time. This is still a net growth of 21, which is at least in the right direction. As other members of the membership team have reported, there have been three Club branches formed and one full Club. The net increase of 21 members reflects the three Club branches but the 20 members of the new full Club are not included in this figure vet as International haven't activated the Club as the time of writing this report. Once this is done, we should end up with a net gain of 41, which will leave us JUST below the transition threshold.

With new Clubs still in the pipeline we are on target to finish the year in June out of transition status.

Motivation and Retention Initiatives

As a Motivation and Retention Officer, plays a pivotal role in enhancing member engagement, fostering retention, and strengthening the overall membership of the district. In lieu, I have continued to actively contribute towards enhancing member engagement and club growth through strategic initiatives. My focus has been on writing motivational articles for the Pride of Lions Magazine, crafting actionable strategies that resonate with members and support retention efforts. these articles are sent to the District Governor for approval before publication, ensuring alignment with the district's strategic objectives, receiving positive feedback from members.

Social media efforts, such as regular posts and reels, have further strengthened outreach and visibility across our district through smart usage of #hashtags and @ followers.

A key highlight of the retention strategy was the successful reinstatement of 9 former Lions members who had left our organisation in June last year, now joined the newly formed London Fortitude Lions Club.

District Membership Growth

Our district began the year with 1,207 members, placing us in transition. Through the collective efforts of all teams and clubs, we have achieved a positive net membership growth, breaching the threshold of 1250. This milestone takes our district out of transition, a significant achievement reflecting our united commitment to growth. Most zones are now working toward sustained positive growth, demonstrating their dedication to Lionism's values and objectives.

Formation of London Fortitude Lions Club

The pre-formation meeting in October, led in collaboration with the DG, GET & GMT team, culminated in the club's official formation of the London Fortitude Lions Club on November 14, 2024, with the total membership count of more than 25, was a major highlight. This "Cancer Specialty" club, a first of its kind in MD105 is located in our zone D. The club's vision, led by Lion President Alfred Samuels, emphasizes impactful campaigns such as advocating for NHSprovided PSA testing for men over 40, an inaugural event held at Houses of Parliament on the 16th of December.

The club's name, "Fortitude," symbolizes strength and courage, in pain and adversity reflecting this new club's mission to address challenges with resolve and hope.

Guiding Lion Appointments

I am honoured to have been appointed as a *Guiding Lion* for two significant club initiatives:

- 1. Supporting and mentoring the London Fortitude Lions Club alongside PDG Lion Ramesh Parmar.
- 2. Reactivating the Aylesbury Lions Club with PDG Lion Doreen Allen. This initiative aims to rejuvenate and sustain one of our district's valued clubs.

Conclusion

This year has been marked by significant achievements, including taking our district out of transition, forming the *London Fortitude Lions Club* and the three club branches so far! Together, we are building a strong foundation for sustained growth and impactful service, making District 105A a beacon of excellence in Lionism. I take this opportunity to wish our DG Kadu and Lion Kaushik a fantastic 2025 Convention and extend my best wishes for the year ahead.

The Answer is yes to all as other DBS applications from employers are not recognised by our Lions Organisation.

Please note it is now strongly encouraged from our organisation that any new members who Joins our association are advised to be DBS checked when representing and working on behalf of our lions Organisation once they have settled in.

All active members and regular friends who volunteer their services at the club activities and work around the vulnerable representing Lions need to be DBS checked.

Fellow Lions, we work hard all year round and are most of the time around the vulnerable even without noticing it.

We owe it to members of the public and the vulnerable people we serve to ensure all Lions have been DBS checked.

Parents and family members who drop off kids and youths to our youth party or the elderly we serve yearly at our senior citizen's party, drop them off assuming their child or partners and friends are surrounded by safe and secure members of our association.

I continue to approach all clubs that do not have any members DBS checked at all...Yes, I know. Still a few out there.

We all should have a DBS, this shows me, as the District Representative for our Multiple District, we have happy safe Lions members working on behalf of our District and hopefully it will also keep away new or old members from even thinking of the unthinkable.

Club Presidents please discuss DBS requirements with your Clubs members and if you stumble on any question/ answers or need any help and support with regards to the DBS process, convincing some members who are flaunting the process then please contact me.

I or a member of the DBS team will join you at a meeting when invited and help your members start off the process.

Fellow Lions new applications are now processed quickly and when I register your DBS online to the update service this will keep your certificate valid as long as your personal circumstances don't change. The club has raised £1,400 for Childhood Cancer at a Bhajan Bhojans event in November 2024 and nearly £1,000 in a Sponsored Walk for LCIF, with an additional £1,000 donated for disaster relief. Members helped raise £2,000 for Cancer Research UK and welcomed two new members, with four prospective members expected soon. Contributions included £100 to Acton Homeless Centre. Weekly tea parties for the elderly at Lion Vivien Raggett's house continue as a beloved signature activity.

London Kingsbury

The Lions Club of London Kingsbury currently has 34 members. Club has been focusing on fundraising and service activities, raising funds for Cancer Research UK and supporting initiatives like "101 Weddings Under One Roof" for underprivileged communities in Valsad, Gujarat. The club has been honoured with the District Trophy for its contributions to Cancer Research. It has also helped fund projects such as a Nursing College, an Eye Hospital in Kenya, and resources for schools and a crematorium. Members provide bereavement services, assist at food banks, and volunteer for humanitarian causes. The club actively supports district activities and collaborates with other clubs to enhance efforts. Recognized for its fundraising, the club is proud of its accomplishments and continues to grow.

Stanmore

Enfield. The club celebrated 50 years in November 2024 with two Charter members still at the club and three new members recently inducted. This report to convention is based on information on the activities within the Zone since 1st July 2024, i.e., the first 6 months of this Lionistic year.

Compared to the end of June 2024 the Zone has grown by 5 to 87 Lions in total. Every Club is either the same size or larger than in June. Several Clubs report likely/planned induction of new members during first half of 2025.

As a Zone we have a strong link through the Lions Bookshop in **Hemel Hempstead** which is managed by **St Albans** but all clubs in the Zone (plus Luton) contribute time, on a rota basis, to the running of the shop. The Clubs consider the bookshop to be both a service activity (it brings people to the centre and acts as a meeting point) and a fund raiser. For all Clubs this is a major source of funds to distribute to other causes. The bookshop also acts as the collection point for the Zone for glasses and hearing aids, over 40,000 pairs of glasses this period.

Clubs both within and outside the Zone help each other with their other activities, for example **St Albans** and their Beer Festival, **Harpenden** and the Highland Gathering, **Watford** and their 2 very successful Firework displays.

Tring have been carrying out ground maintenance in locations in Leighton Buzzard, Tring and Wigginton plus litter picking, **Harpenden** have been planting Trees and bulbs for the local Council.

Tring have been raising funds through running online quizzes, holding Tring Together Christmas Evening and Christmas Eve Carol Service (over 1000 people attended and £1600 raised for Herts Young Homeless) and will be holding stalls at the Aldbury May Day Fair and Tring Carnival.

St Albans supports Centre 33 giving meals to needy families on a regular basis. **St Albans, Watford** and **Tring** have run Fish and chip suppers for the elderly, over 250 attendees. **Hemel Hempstead** have run cream teas at local care homes and sponsor a local girl's football team.

Hemel Hempstead have helped a number of individuals in the local area. These include families who have moved on from abusive relationships, funded a wet room for a gentleman who has Huntington's chorea and provided Christmas goodies for children in 6 needy families.

Hemel Hempstead have also fully funded a sight camera for the district.

Harpenden have this year now exceeded £300,000 in total given to local schools through their Life Skills Programme.

Harpenden held a very successful Ceilidh in support of the Waterways Experience charity for trips for disabled people and a Christmas Tin shake for Harpenden First Responders. Their Harpenden based interactive defibrillator map is now available on the web.

Watford and **St Albans** (and **Harpenden** supporting Rotary) been actively fundraising through Santa Sleighs running up to Christmas.

Harpenden and **St Albans** will be collecting Christmas Trees supporting the <u>Hospice of St Francis.</u>

All Clubs have done many other service activities and given generously to many causes over the period.

Finally, the Clubs are looking at a new 'Zone Project' linked to the regeneration of a museum and education facility at Frogmore paper Mill which was devastated by arson. The facility serves people and schools both within the Zone and further afield.

DG and my family of Lions,

Since our last Convention we have delivered approximately 110,000 pairs of glasses to Birmingham HQ, and my office and the Hemel bookshop are empty (for once!). There have been many donations from a number of Clubs including some we have collected from for the first time, such as London Central Host. Many Clubs including St Albans, Luton, Letchworth Garden City & Baldock, Bletchley, M K Stony Stratford, Harrow & Pinner, Hemel Hempstead, Bedford and London St Johns Wood (to name just a few) have been involved in this valuable service activity. There will hopefully be a van available at the District Convention again this year for collecting as has become usual. I would be very grateful if Clubs would please ensure that they record their collections on the Lions Portal, as sometimes this is the only way we can keep a track of how many pairs we are collecting as a District.

The main news over the last few months relates to the Child Sight Vision Screening Project. Approximately £13,100 was raised for the original Spot Camera project back around the time of the pandemic. We then set up a fundraiser with the aim of boosting this to £56,000 - which will purchase 10 of the Plusoptix cameras we will be using for the project. A match-funding grant was then applied for in October which would boost this to 20 cameras - we will know if we've been successful at some point in mid-January.

In the meantime, the fundraiser currently stands at £51,000, leaving us roughly £5,000 short of the target, though an additional fundraising email has been sent out to try and fill this shortfall. MD have organised training for members of each District to act as "train the trainers". Several members of District 105A were trained in this role on 7th December and there are approximately 15 of us who can now train the "ground crew" who will eventually be going into the schools. Paperwork has been drafted and will be finalised very early in the new year, so that when these Lions members are being trained on the use of the cameras, the paperwork side of things can be sorted at the same time.

Only two Districts (us and CE) are participating in the first round of match funding applications - the other Districts should follow next time around. Since District 105CE have already participated in pilot screenings, it is anticipated that some members of the 105A team will join them on their first rounds of real screenings (beginning in January) so that we can learn the ropes in a real environment.

Each District has been asked to nominate a District Lead for the Child Sight Project. Past International Director Geoff Leeder has now been appointed to this position and will be responsible for the bulk of the coordination work and the running of the project in District 105A. There is still much going on behind the scenes and we are working together to ensure that this valuable service activity can fulfil it's potential, to both change the lives of some of the nation's youngsters and raise the profile of Lions in the UK at the same time.

In the UK, around 3,755 children and young adults get diagnosed with cancer each year and unfortunately it remains the leading cause of all childhood deaths. Our role in Lions Club District 105A is to raise awareness and funds to help the young people and their families as they cope with the diagnosis, treatment and after effects of the many forms of cancer.

District 105A can be extremely proud of their achievements in raising awareness and funds whilst also providing practical help. Since July 1st, 2024, until December 2024 the District has completed 19 service activities serving 1,836 people.

Lions Centennial Club held a bucket collection on the 9th of August and Milton Keynes Stony Stratford raised £295 in August at a Car Boot Sale. Fairlop Club raised £100 at a Fund-Raising Golf Day on the 1st August and their Leo Club organised a Bring and Buy Sale raising £124.

Penny Tregillus from Tring Club attended the Studhambury Music Festival where over £5,000 was raised and she ran 2 can shakes in September raising £321.50. I joined Penny at the Young Lives vs Cancer fundraiser, run by SD Carpentry, at the Axe and Compass in Heath and Reach 7th September where £1001.41 was raised.

As part of the Roar management Team, I attend the regular monthly meetings to share progress, issues or concerns and ways we can improve the Lions ROAR programme for the future. We are pleased to be able to say that every District within our Multiple District 105 was represented in both the registration of schools taking part and the Lions Clubs sponsoring those schools. In total, one hundred and Forty-Six schools, an increase of 7%, were sponsored by seventy-six Lions Clubs, a growth of 17% on the 2024 numbers.

District 105A had nine schools registered and taking part this year.

Congratulations go to the Lions Clubs of:

London Belmont for registering Belmont Primary School, Luton for registering Wigmore Primary School, Biggleswade and Sandy for registering Gamlingay Primary School, Northwood for registering Frithwood Primary and Hillside Primary, Harrow and Pinner for registering Camrose Primary, Earlsmead Primary, and The Glebe Primary School.

The judging to determine our District winner took place via Zoom, and I thank the DGs team for their time viewing the school videos and scoring them. After much deliberation, I am pleased to announce that the **Earlsmead Primary School was our winning school;** they were sponsored by Harrow and Pinner LC, and the trophy will be presented to the club at the upcoming District Convention in March.

The National Awards Day took place on December 4th and was very well attended by Lions and schools alike. The children's enthusiasm was a joy to see, and presentations were outstanding with ideas from teams ranging from air pollution filter robots to homeless pack distribution machines, plastic sea cleanup robots, and seed planting drones.

Pupils given opportunity to take part in the Lions ROAR programme are learning life skills for the future, collaborating and communicating with others, making decisions and assessments, beginning to understand the importance of presentation and the need to make and evaluate prototypes to try out their ideas. These children may well be the adults of the future finding solutions for the problems facing the earth which they will inherit. Prince Williams Earth Shot Prize has very similar aims. It allows people to work with others to share their ideas, innovations, and technology to make the world a cleaner, better place. They too are given the opportunity to "Think and Dream big".

Our District has had at least 15 schools involved in this project in the last three years, which means over five and a half thousand children in our District have heard of the Lions and know a little about what they do.

Multiply that number by the number of teachers, school staff, parents, and relatives involved with schools with access to school newsletters and events, and we could be reaching more than ten thousand people. Any one of those contacts could be a future member of your club or a club in our District.

It is never too soon to be thinking about this year's competition; whilst it doesn't start until September 2025, identifying schools now and starting those early discussions is crucial for the success of the programme and of course, it would be great to increase the number of schools and Lion Clubs from 105A taking part this year. As you answer the call to donate monies or books to schools in your community, ask for 5 minutes to talk with the Headteacher, Deputy headteacher or year group lead about the ROAR programme.

As incoming MD Roar Officer (January 2025) I was also part of the Team that met with *8BillionIdeas in November to begin planning for ROAR 2025. Although both parties were pleased with the joint progress made this year, we continue to investigate ways to expand the marketing strategies to better involve both schools and Lions Clubs in the ROAR programme. Previous marketing ideas were discussed, including approaching schools who had previously taken part in ROAR with a letter inviting them to voice their interest in taking part in ROAR 2025, making contact with local headteacher groups, increasing social media coverage, District Officers working to grow interest in the Lions ROAR programme and to ask those schools attending the National Finals in December to use the QR code to voice interest in taking part in Lions ROAR 2025. The data is still being collected, but 105A is off to a good start, with four schools already asking to be involved in ROAR 2025.

To help members of the deaf community communicate more effectively with the hearing community I can provide resources (Door Hangers, Deaf Aware Cards and I SEE WHAT YOU'RE SAYING Badges). I can come to Clubs/Zones to give talks about Deaf Awareness and Deaf Aware Training to members of the hearing community so they can learn about deafness and how to communicate more effectively with people who have a hearing problem.

To help hearing impaired people abroad Lions in MD105 have been collecting used and unwanted hearing equipment (hearing aids and other audiological equipment. They are sent to Dr Michael Nolan who refurbishes it and finds new owners for it. Since the 1st of January they been sent to Cambodia, Egypt, India, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Sri Lanka, Sudan, Tanzania, Yemen and Zambia.

When a hearing-impaired person receives a refurbished hearing aid and additional equipment it opens up a whole new world to them and they hear sounds again that we take for granted.

Between July and December 2024 11,299 used hearing aids have been donated by Clubs in the Multiple District. 875 hearing aids have been donated by 5 Clubs in this District and hospital audiological departments. These Clubs are Bletchley Milton Keynes, Letchworth Garden City and Baldock, Luton, Newport Pagnell and Olney and Tring. My thanks goes to them. I would encourage all Clubs in this District to get involved. Instructions are below on how to send off used hearing aids.

Send them, via the postal service or a courier service, to Dr Michael Nolan, Lumb Gaps Barn, Haslingden Old Road, Rossendale, BB4 8TT. In your package include contact details- name of person and Club and a telephone number or email address so a" Thank You" message can be sent. Alternatively send used hearing aids and audiological equipment with your spectacles via Chichester Lions Club or to National Headquarters.

New NHS hearing aid batteries are being distributed through the Lions Bookshop in Hemel Hempstead, to the general public. If you have a location you could distribute them to please contact me.

Lion Andrew Zelkin from District 105CE, is collecting used button sized hearing aid batteries. He is recycling the metals from them. The money raised from them is going towards buying Sight Cameras for the District Child Sight Programme. Clubs, please collect them and give them to Zone Chairman to bring along to Cabinet Meetings so they can be given to me.

Support Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, which is a charity which helps deaf people. It is based District. To find out more about what they do please visit their website https://www.hearingdogs.org.uk/ They welcome donations and visits to their headquarters.

The Lions "Message in a Bottle" initiative is a simple way for people to keep their essential personal and medical details where they can be found by emergency services, on a standard form, and in a common location, i.e., the fridge.

It means that first responders can save valuable time by identifying an individual and knowing if they have any allergies or take any special medication. Many Clubs in our District have embraced this service project and distribute the bottles through various places:

- Hospital discharge centres.
- Sheltered accommodation for Vulnerable people
- Housing associations.
- Community Health Centres
- Events in the community.
- Libraries.
- Surgeries.
- Organisations working with elderly and lonely individuals.

The bottles are available directly from the Multiple District headquarters in boxes of 100 or 200. and the cost is £60 plus postage for 100 bottles. Unfortunately, pallets are no longer available, however, larger amounts can be ordered. The cost for the bottles is the same but the postage will vary.

There is a dedicated website to the Lions "Message in a Bottle": https://lionsmessageinabottle.co.uk/

This service project is simple and a good way to establish contact with the emergency services, whilst promoting Lions in the local community. I would urge Clubs not already participating to look at starting this service activity in their communities.

Message in a Wallet is another lifesaving initiative and is used by many Clubs to complement Message in a Bottle. Whereas the bottle is designed to contain emergency medical and contact details and sit in the fridge at home, Message in a Wallet does the same thing for someone who is out and about. The details are filled out and the credit-card sized fold-out leaflet is for a purse or wallet.

MedicAlert are the pioneers of medical IDs and are the only charity that provides life-saving medical ID services worldwide. Medical IDs hold the most vital medication information and provide essential information in an emergency. They are most commonly bracelets or necklaces, worn on pulse points for easy identification by first responders. The most vital conditions are engraved alongside the membership number on the jewellery. With access to a 24/7, 365 days emergency helpline, the fully digital medical record can be accessed when

needed.

The cost of a basic MedicAlert bracelet can be $\pounds 20-\pounds 40$ with an additional membership of $\pounds 32$ per year. Clubs can sponsor adults by giving a donation for MedicAlert.

Lions in the British Isles have had a relationship with MedicAlert for over 55 years. Clubs are encouraged to support the Early Start programme by sponsoring a child for £300. This covers a free annual membership for a vulnerable child up until their 10th birthday. If the child does not use the full ten years, membership can be passed onto another child. MedicAlert have list of children so Clubs can ask to sponsor a child in their own area.

In our District, we can promote MedicAlert by:

- Providing awareness about MedicAlert in events – leaflets are available from the Multiple District Headquarters.
- Invite a guest speaker to Club meetings.
- Partner with a school, scouts/cubs, or a youth organisation to sponsor a MedicAlert membership for at risk child /children with Type 1 Diabetes.

District 105A is twinned with Poland District 121 & Germany District 111NW

Upon reviewing the urgent flood relief situation in Poland 121, DG Kadu sent an appeal to the Clubs to raise much needed funds to meet the urgent need. We have to date received a sum of £1176.00, however an update will be in due course.

I am also waiting for a report from Poland as to how they are progressing and coping with the situation.

We have sent out 'Save the date' invitations to Germany District 111NW and Poland District 121, for the attention of DG or representative to attend our District Convention on February 28th – 2nd March 2025.

Street Children

I would like to take this opportunity to recap a project supporting Street Children across the world. I was introduced to this initiative at the International Convention in 1996-1997 in Montreal, when PIP Augustine Soliva presented a programme focused on building bridges with Street Children in the aftermath of the much-publicized shootings of Street Children in Brazil. I introduced the programme to District 105A and it was also adopted by MD 105.

I served as the District/MD Street Officer and was followed by PDG Brindar Nandra and Lion Joginder Gill as District officers. D105A introduced programmes like sleeping bags, hats and scarves etc., and established a coordination with a number of NGOs actively supporting street children in the field, under the umbrella of Consortium for Street Children (CSC).

A presentation by the members of the Consortium for Street Children (CSC) team supporting street children across the world was very well received at the last cabinet meeting on 13th October 2024.

They also presented a project to improve of thousands of street children and have identified Kolkata in India as a launchpad. The project was voted to be supported by the Cabinet members.

CSC is in the process of preparing the documentation to support this project going forward. An update will be issued in due course.

I also took further initiative with this project and discussed it with 1st VP AP Singh (based in Kolkata) at the Europa Forum. He has re-confirmed interest in supporting the project on the ground giving support to the CSC team.

68th Europa Forum 2024

I attended the Europa Forum in Bordeaux, France in October, and reestablished contacts with Lions in Europe and International. The emphasis at the Europa Forum was supporting the Mission 1.5 and LCIF.

Resolution 1: Proposed by the District Treasurer on behalf of District Cabinet

This Convention resolves that:

The District Dues for the Fiscal Year 2025/26 shall be in the sum of £12.00 per member as per breakdown below@

The breakdown of figures are: 2025-2026		2024-2025
Administration Fund	5.28	4.88
105A News Fund	0.00	0.80
Convention Fund	6.72	6.40
District Dues - 2025/2026	12.00	12.08

This sum shall be payable in two equal instalments - £6.00 per Lion member by 31st July 2025 based upon the known membership as at 1st July 2025 and £6.00 per Lion member by 31st January 2026 based upon the known membership as at 1st January 2026.

Explanatory note:

"To provide revenue to defray the administrative expenses of District 105A the District Cabinet shall table a resolution at every Annual District Convention to set the per capita levy for the following fiscal year. If such resolution shall fail, then the per capita levy in place at that time, shall be continued until changed by resolution.

The administrative sum shall be levied upon each member of each club in the district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments per club member."



This Convention Resolves that:

District 105A shall adopt the policy of Lions International and MD 105 regarding Leo-Lions that current or former Leos of legal majority (18 years of age) through to age 35, who have served as a Leo for at least one year and one day may continue to serve as a Leo-Lion, thus giving a discount of 50% of District Dues.

Explanatory note:

The Policy of Lions International (LI) is that Leo-Lions are entitled to a discount of 50% of their International Dues. MD 105 agreed a similar resolution at May 2024 Convention in Weston Super Mare. If adopted, this resolution will bring the Policy of District 105A into line with that of LI and MD 105.

We all wish to see our Association grow, particularly with younger members and this is one way in which we can recognise the contribution of our Leos to our Association. It will also positively encourage them to become Lions, once reaching the age of Legal Majority. While the cost to our District is small with just three Leo-Lions at present, the benefit and impact to our District and our Clubs could be far greater. The adoption of this Resolution by Convention could encourage more Leo-Lions in further education especially, who can further encourage their fellow students to become members, by demonstrating that Lions care about the younger generation. To be enacted, this Resolution will require a simple (50% + 1) majority of those delegates who exercise their right to vote.





CONVENTION RULES OF PROCEDURE - 2025

CHAIRPERSON

- 1 The District Governor or, in their absence, the First Vice District Governor or if they are not available the Second Vice District Governor, shall preside at Convention.
- 2 The Chairperson shall have discretion in selecting speakers, in deciding on the number of speakers to any resolution/ amendment and in terminating discussion whenever they considers it appropriate.
- 3 The Chairperson, being entirely neutral, shall not be a delegate of his/her Club. If, at any time, he/she wishes to express a personal opinion on a matter under discussion, he/she (or they) shall vacate the Chair for this purpose.

SPEAKERS

- 4 On the Chairperson standing any speaker shall yield to the Chair and immediately resume their seat.
- 5(a) Any delegate wishing to speak on any resolution/amendment or other matter of business, must use a microphone, announce their name and Club and address the Chair.
- 5(b) If a member of the Cabinet speaks on any resolution/amendment or other matter of business, he.she shall state whether he/she is representing the views of Cabinet or otherwise.

RESOLUTIONS AND AMENDMENTS

- 6 Resolutions/amendments will be moved and seconded as follows:
- (a) By nominees on behalf of the Cabinet
- (b) By delegates on behalf of a Club (or of two Clubs when a Resolution is sponsored by more than one Club).
- 7(a) If no delegates are present from a Club submitting a resolution/amendment then, unless that Club advises the Chairperson of the Resolutions, Nominations, Constitution and By-Laws Committee in writing at least ten (10) days before commencement of the Convention of the names of a proposer and seconder from another Club, the resolution/amendment shall be withdrawn, unless Convention shall decide otherwise. With this one exception no resolution/amendment may be withdrawn without the consent of Convention.
- (b) If a resolution be withdrawn with the consent of Convention and there is an amendment to that resolution tabled, then that amended resolution shall become the substantive resolution.
- (c) All resolutions/amendments shall be moved and seconded before consideration by Convention and not

more than one resolution/ amendment shall be discussed at any one time.

(d) A delegate shall not move more than one amendment to any one resolution nor shall the mover of a resolution move any amendment to such resolution.

(e) Where appropriate and convenient, resolutions/amendments will be put for consideration immediately following the adoption of the relevant Committee Chairperson's or Specialist Officer's report.

EMERGENCY RESOLUTIONS AND AMENDMENTS

- 8 The Chairperson shall have discretion to submit an emergency resolution/ amendment for consideration at Convention provided:
- (a) Where appropriate, the resolution/ amendment was received by him/her in writing before the commencement of the opening session of Convention.
- (b) In his/her opinion, the resolution/ amendment could not reasonably have been submitted to the Resolutions, Nominations, Constitution and By-Laws Committee on or before the closing dates as decided by Cabinet for their receipt by such Committee and
- (c) Convention consents by a majority of registered delegates present and voting to the resolution/amendment being so considered.

DELEGATE TO SPEAK ONCE ONLY

- 9(a) Subject only to the provision of Section 17 hereof, a delegate shall not speak more than once to the same resolution/ amendment without the consent of Convention:
- (b) Only the Chairperson or the mover of a resolution exercising his/her right of reply shall speak more than once on any resolution.

TIME LIMITS FOR SPEECHES

- 10(a) The proposer of a resolution/ amendment will be permitted a maximum of three (3) minutes to put his/her case and after doing so shall formally move the resolution/ amendment. Normally the seconder will formally second the resolution and may reserve the right to speak later. At the conclusion of the debate and before a vote is taken on a resolution, the proposer of the resolution shall have the right of reply for the purpose of answering questions or clarifying points raised. He/she will not be permitted to introduce fresh arguments and shall not be allowed more than two (2) minutes for this purpose;
- (b) The mover of an amendment shall not be entitled to the right of reply except when an original resolution has been

displaced by an amendment which has become a substantive resolution in accordance with Clause 7(b) above, when the right of reply ensues to the mover of the amendment.

- 11 (a) With the exception of the time limits stated in Clause 10(a), every speaker in general debate will be limited to two (2) minutes and must direct his/her speech strictly to the report, resolution, or amendment under discussion.
- (b) The times specified for speakers may be exceeded only with approval of Convention.

VOTING

- 12 The voting on any resolution/ amendment or general business shall be by show of delegate cards of those present and voting and the Chairperson shall declare the result or order a count. If the Chairperson's declaration is challenged by twenty or more delegates the votes shall be counted.
- 13 Any election of candidates for office shall be in accordance with Article I, Section 3, of the District Constitution By-Laws.
- 14 Any election for the appointment of Host Clubs for future Conventions shall be by secret ballot and the nomination receiving the majority of votes shall be declared elected.
- 15 In the event of a tie following a show of delegate cards or secret ballot the Chairperson shall cast the deciding vote.

ACTION TO PROCEED TO NEXT BUSINESS

16 Any delegate, provided he/she has not already spoken on the matter under discussion, may move at any time that Convention proceeds to the next business and, if this resolution be seconded and carried, the Chairperson shall put the matter to Convention, after the mover of the resolution has been offered the right of reply.

POINT OF ORDER QUESTION

17 Any delegate may, at any time, ask a question or raise a point of order through the Chair but must confine the question or point of order to the subject before Convention.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS

18 Any of these Rules of Procedure (to be known as Convention Standing Orders) may be suspended by resolution of Convention in relation to a specific item of business properly before Convention, provided at least two-thirds of the delegates present and voting shall vote for such resolution.
